


Key vocabulary

Gurdwara - a Sikh place of worship

Guru- a wise teacher

Guru Granth Sahib - Sikh Holy book

Guru Nanak – the first Guru (of 10) and founder of Sikhism

Khanda - a Sikh symbol (two edged sword)

langar - a big room in the Gurdwara where free food is served

Nishan Sahib - the name for the Sikh flag

Panjabi - language spoken by Punjabis

Patka – a covering for a boy's head before he starts using a turban

temple - a large building where people meet to pray turban - a head covering for men

vegetarian - some-one who does not eat meat or fish

<u>Key facts</u>

Sikhs believe in one God who made the world all people. They believe everyone is equal and a member of God's family. Sikhs pray in a Gurdwara which could be a room at home or in a large temple.

The Sikh holy book is called the Guru Granth Sahib. 'Guru' means teacher. Guru Nanak started the Sikh religion. Not cutting hair is part of the Sikh religion. Hair is covered with a patka (boys) or a turban (men.)

In the Gurdwara people take their shoes off and sit on the floor cross legged. Men sit on one side and women on the other side.

After the service everyone eats in the langar.
